## Jack Abraham - Gliding Scholarship 2016

I have just undergone my intensive gliding course at London Gliding club in Dunstable, from the 22nd to the 26th of August 2016. This amazing opportunity came round when I was looking for scholarships on the internet and came across The Honourable Company Of Air Pilots. I submitted my application with hope that I would be accepted after drafting my form many times to make sure it was perfect! My family drove me

down to London for the interview with the company. I'm never a nervous person but this was different. I got accepted and given the dates, I was over the moon!

When being launched by the winch it was around 0-60 in 2 seconds; You could really feel the G-force! The weather was great on that day which resulted in getting pretty sunburnt, that wasn't going to stop me having fun and getting up in the air. Further on in the day I got to take control of the second part of the winch launch which was hard work.

The next day we had a new instructor (Bob Dowty). We had him for the remaining 3 days. Day 3 was a slow start for me as I was trying to find signal on the airfield to receive my GCSE results from my mum and sorting out college. There was only a couple of subjects which meant the most to me as it kept my options open for careers in aviation. On my last day I had come on so much with my gliding that I was doing everything by



myself by day 4. Over the course of the week I felt myself improving at a speed that I never thought I would which was all down to the instructors and my passion to want to learn more. When I first started I never knew how hard the gliding would be as you're doing everything at once all at the same time with no room for error.
