
## The Beginnings

## Getting the Scholarship

I was 14 at the time so had to wait a few years till I could apply. However, in that time, I applied to a gliding scholarship with the Honourable company of air pilots and unfortunately was unsuccessful at the application phase. Fast forward a year, after reading the past winners reports over and over, and starting my PPL, it was time to apply again. This time for the PPL scholarship. After finally sending in my application after a month of editing, I eagerly waited for the email response to find out whether or not I had been successful this time around.



I was over the moon. I had a moment of euphoric happiness when the email come through telling me I had been successful at the application phase. I had been invited to the Honorable Company Air Pilots, company office, Cobham House, in London. With an early start, I spent the time on the train preparing myself for the most important interview of my life. Having arrived at Chancery Lane I enjoyed a quick Wetherspoons breakfast, amazed that people were drinking at

7am! something I wasn't aware of having grown up in the hinterlands of the east!

Polishing off my Full English in no time, it was interview time. I made myself comfortable with the other 4 candidates sharing the interview session with me. Angie was very helpful, making the whole experience enjoyable and not at any point did I feel under pressure. Once a few forms had been signed, I had to complete a short aptitude test, consisting of mainly basic math and physics questions, before being whisked away by the immediate Past Master, Chris Ford for the interview itself. Joining Chris as an interviewer, Kat Hodge, A Senior first officer at Virgin Atlantic. I really enjoyed the interview, communicating my passion as calmly but as emotionally as possible to demonstrate my true desire and aspiration for my future as a commercial airline pilot. Happy with the interview, I left Cobham House, with another PPL scholar, Stan, who I immediately became friends with due to his kindness and a similar passion for flight. After bidding farewell, I headed back to quiet Suffolk and sat on the train revising for my geography exam, which was a week after the interview. Naturally, after an interview, you start to dwell on the negatives, the things that could've been better. However, after just a few days my doubts were put to rest when I received an email confirming that I had been awarded a highly prestigious and recognized Honorable company of Air Pilots private pilots license scholarship. I felt incredibly lucky that I would spend my summer flying and would have my PPL at the end of it. It provided the perfect motivation for my upcoming AS exams, which were over as soon as they started. It was time to fly!
