SECRETARY'S REPORT

Greetings fellow Air Pilots,

MEMBERSHIP ENGAGEMENT

A Membership Engagement sub-committee has met several times with a view to both increase membership, particularly among younger aviators, and to provide better engagement with current members. We reached out to our colleagues in both the UK and Australia to see what measures they found effective. The feedback we have received suggests that, as we suspected, frequent and widespread use of social media is a key factor in meeting both aims.

To this end, we have created Air Pilots (NZ) sites on Instagram, Facebook and LinkedIn. We will attempt to post to these sites reasonable frequently, raising the Air Pilots profile and providing useful information on

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT WEBINARS

Our Technical Director, CAPT Mike Zaytsoff, continues his series of professional development webinars each month. These are conducted at 1000hrs on the second Wednesday of each month. You should have all received email invitations to join these webinars – if not, please contact the secretary and we'll ensure you are on future invitations. These presentations are conducted in partnership with the NZ Society of Air Safety Investigators (NZSASI) and are open to all who are interested.

Webinars planned for the coming months are:

- July 9: Grant Newman, an aviation engineer turned historian discussing a thankfully-not-required modification to Lancaster bombers to carry a nuclear payload.
- August 13: Corporal Dean Scott of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police discussing an ATR runway excursion in the Arctic he did the preliminary investigation on.
- September 10: Jon Lee, the Western Regional Manager for Canada's equivalent of the NZ TAIC discussing well written accident reports and poorly written ones.

HOUSE OF SCIENCE STEM INITIATIVE

The NZ Aviation Federation, along with a range of other aviation bodies, has recently agreed to sponsor the development of practical learning kits to promote aviation-related learning in primary schools. The 'House of Science' produces similar themed kits for schools across NZ but is now developing a kit that allows hands-on student learning with an aviation focus. The NZ Region was asked to provide funding support for a kit to support a region over five years, at a total value of some \$15,000. While the committee agreed that the initiative was commendable, we did not believe that such an investment was consistent with the aims of the Company. It was also noted that it would make a significant dent in our financial position, potentially impacting other outlays (including the Master's Visit and the annual instructor scholarship).

We have agreed, however, to canvas the wider membership seeking expressions of interest in financially contributing to the development of an aviation 'House of Science' kit for a region. Any combined contribution need not be a five year commitment – if members collectively contribute \$3,000 a kit can be funded for school use for one year. If anyone wishes to consider supporting this scheme please register your interest with the secretary.

HOUSE OF SCIENCE INITIATIVE

Strong sponsorship support enabled the NZAF Council to take the decision last week to go ahead with the investment to develop a House of Science "Flight Kit".

NZAF are excited by this opportunity to reach out to the youngsters who will be the next generation of scientists, technicians, engineers and mathematicians in New Zealand. This is important, we believe, to NZ Inc and also it enables us to implant an interest in aviation as a future opportunity.

Answers to some frequently asked questions include:

- The kit will contain experiments to engage and educate the children about aviation. A core question which has been established is: How do aircraft fly? There are no lectures from the teachers; there are no on-line exercises; this is all intended to be hands-on fun!
- It will take until the end of October for the Flight Kit to be developed and to go through beta testing.
- The development phase includes House of Science engaging with experts from the aviation field to brainstorm the type of experiments that can be included in the kit. So, we are going to reach out for assistance.
- House of Science branches are located in the Far North, Mid North, West Auckland, South Auckland, Central Waikato, North Waikato, South Waikato, Western Bay of Plenty, Eastern Bay of Plenty, Rotorua Lakes, Ruapehu, Whanganui, Taranaki, Tairāwhiti, Hawke's Bay, Horowhenua/ Manawatū/ Kapiti, Wairarapa, Hutt Valley, Wellington, Christchurch and Nelson.
- As a sponsor you are entitled to ask that your kit be sent to one of these branches. More information about the branches and their associated schools can be found on the House of Science website at Find Your School
- Once beta testing is complete the replication of kits will start and House of Science will be in touch to invoice for the creation of the replica kits.
- The branches are libraries where the kits are held. Once the kits are with the branches, their cadre of schools can book the kit for a two-week period after which they are returned to the library for refreshing and reissue to another school. The annual \$3,000 cost is for the on-going re-packaging of the kits and replacement of consumables (potentially 18 times a year).
- House of Science will provide regular reports to NZAF on the utilisation of the kits and these will be provided to you.
