However, on Tuesday and Wednesday, the weather had turned for the worse, and we were unable to

do any gliding those days, however we did use the simulator, which itself is very realistic, and provided a great substitute for flying.

When Thursday and Friday rolled around, the weather had decided to be nicer, and we all managed to get several winch launches each in on each day. On these days, we were able to apply what we had learnt in the simulator in real life, namely, landing and circuit practice. Rather unfortunately, the course came to an end just as

On the Friday evening, we were presented with our certificates, and on Saturday morning, it was time to bid farewell. We had become great friends, despite only knowing each other for a week.
